We conducted an additional analysis to examine whether parent socialization at Time 1 predicted adolescents' racial attitudes at Time 1. The model fit the data well: X^2 (12) = 42.50, p = .96; CFI = .95; RMSEA = .07; SRMR=.036. Similar to the first model results, parents' color-conscious racial socialization at Time 1 was negatively associated with adolescents' negative racial attitudes (β = -.29, p < .001) at Time 2. Additionally, the interaction effect between parents' color-conscious racial socialization and psychological control on adolescents' racial attitudes was significant (β = .19, p < .001). Only when parental psychological control was low or average, parents' color-conscious socialization was negatively related to adolescents' negative attitudes (β = -.48, p < .001; β = -.29, p < .001, respectively). However, unlike the previous model results, the path between parental psychological control and adolescents' racial attitudes was also significant (β = .14, p = .002).
